We spoke with Luciano Lusardi, General Manager & CEO of Borgo Pignano about what makes this private, 18th-century villa and Etruscan hamlet such a unique and memorable place to visit.

Excluding the landscape, what most inspires you most about Borgo Pignano?

Borgo Pignano has an extremely tranquil atmosphere where guests feel completely at ease and relaxed, the exceptional location effortlessly combines history, architecture, nature and creativity which inspires our guests to explore the unspoilt countryside or indulge in a painting or cooking class or other activity on the estate. The far-reaching views from the 18th-century villa encourage guests to slow down and the exceptional surroundings inspire them to take time out of their normally hectic lifestyles and find a little peace and harmony.



What does a typical day for a visitor to Borgo Pignano consist of?

As the sun rises over the Etruscan hamlet at Borgo Pignano, guests awake to the sound of birdsong and the aroma of freshly baked bread. Breakfast is a relaxed affair in the shaded courtyard filled with the scent of the lemon trees; the organic pastries, breads and home-made jams are accompanied by

fruit from the Pignano's kitchen gardens and herbal teas. After breakfast, many guests take a gentle stroll around the estate, passing the stables to meet the horses and wander through the woods and meadows surrounding the main villa. There are many activities to choose from, including cooking and painting classes, mountain biking, horse-riding and, of course, sunbathing by the infinity pool. Lunch can be enjoyed at the al-fresco restaurant, located on its own private terrace overlooking the hills and valleys of Volterra and beyond. In the afternoon, guests either relax in the gardens, read in the library or indulge in a treatment in the beautiful spa. Evenings start with a cocktail on the lawn followed by a seasonal fine-dining experience in the elegant Villa Pignano restaurant.



What's unique about the viewpoint of people from Borgo Pignano (or Tuscany at large)?

In Tuscany and particularly at Borgo Pignano, people are driven by a shared philosophy for authenticity, and a deep-rooted respect for the land and what it provides throughout the year. The day-to-day life at Borgo Pignano celebrates simple pleasures such as harvesting organically grown crops and the preparation of seasonal ingredients for the hotel's two excellent restaurants. The Pignano team all work together to create a harmonious experience for guests, from dawn to dusk, the attention to detail and comfort of the guests is paramount. There is an intrinsic link from the farm, gardens and countryside to the villa, cottages and maisonettes. The gardeners, farmers, herbalists, beekeepers, riding instructors, cleaners, housekeepers, chefs, spa therapists and front of house staff all support each other throughout the day. For example, the herbalist will supply freshly cut herbs and flowers from the garden and present these to the housekeeping staff for use in the suites and rooms.

What do you think has drawn back the Royal Drawing School to Borgo Pignano year after year?

The Royal Drawing School has a strong and ongoing relationship with Borgo Pignano as the owner, Sir Michael Moritz, is a supporter of British Contemporary Arts and offers selected scholarships to several talented students each year. Throughout the estate you will find inspiring private collections

of art, the exceptional Tuscan light and breathtaking views that encourage artists to explore their creativity whilst staying at Pignano. The arts connection is further evident in the hotel's own gallery which hosts many seasonal exhibitions and cultural events. Art equipment such as paint brushes, pastels and paints are available for all guests to use throughout their stay and painting classes can be organised.
